

Leaf It to Us



WELCOME TO OUR AUTUMN NEWSLETTER!

For many, Autumn is the best season of the year and they eagerly anticipate its arrival. It is a favorite for us also, when the colors of the leaves turn and mornings greet us with a crispness that announces the changing of the seasons. It's also a busy time of year as we try to finish our summer projects and think about buttoning up our homes and yards for winter. Inside we are ready for candles, warm blankets and soup for dinner. Outside, it's time to prepare the yard for the winter ahead. We have some great tips and tricks to help you and your trees prepare for the dormant season.

Autumn Tips & Tricks



LEAVE THE LEAVES WHERE THEY LAND

Our arborists care about your trees, and the foundation for healthy trees is good soil. This is why our arborists recommend leaving leaves on the ground rather than raking them up and disposing of them. When the leaves fall from deciduous trees, they create a natural blanket that helps to insulate the ground while providing shelter for beneficial insects. As the leaves break down over the winter, they release nutrients that will feed next years lawn or plants and improve the overall soil biology in your yard. This works best when the leaves are not piled too thick. Mowing over large leaves to reduce their surface area will aid in their transformation to beneficial compost. Small leaves will transform without too much help and by spring will be nearly gone without much intervention.

MANAGE YOUR MULCH

Now is the time to freshen up the mulch around your trees. Organic mulch such as ground-up leaves, weed-free straw or wood chips will help to maintain soil temperatures, conserve soil moisture and provide resilience against erosion. We recommend 1-3 inches of mulch at the base of trees, but be sure not to pile the mulch up against the trunk of the tree. This is sometimes referred to as volcano mulching which can cause rotting bark, creating an access point for insects and diseases.

CABLES & BRACES: CHECK

If you have a tree with additional supports installed such as cables or bracing, this is a good time to have those checked by a professional arborist. These support systems are intended to reduce the risk of failure or damage to weak branches and multiple stems. Severe weather can add additional stress, so you want to ensure that you support systems are fully in tact and performing before inclement weather occurs.

If you do not have supports installed but have concerns about limb integrity, v-crotch stems, over-extended limbs, cracks, splitting or any other structural issues that may cause an area of your tree to become weakened, we recommend having the tree checked by a professional arborist. Support systems can help to mitigate risks and protect the health and beauty of your tree.

LEARN YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD'S TREE EQUITY | PLANT A TREE

Did you know that there's a website where you can find out the tree equity score for where you live, right down to your neighborhood? What is a tree equity score? The scores are based on how much tree canopy and surface temperature align with income, employment, race, age, health factors and more. Each score indicates whether there are enough trees in specific neighborhoods for everyone there to experience the benefits that

tree canopy cover provides. You can use the score to make a case for planting trees in the areas that need them most. Want to know your tree equity score? Check it out at treeequityscore.org.

Tree in the Spotlight



PACIFIC MADRONE (Arbutus Menziesii)

The **Pacific Madrone** features reddish-brown bark that peels each summer in thin strips to reveal smooth, green-yellow bark that ripens into a dark red.

Pros

- Native to the West coast
- Attractive bark and form
- Persistent broad-leaf foliage
- Excellent for pollinators & hummingbirds
- Excellent food source for migrating birds
- Well adapted to drought and climate change

Cons

- Not readily available at nurseries
- Does not transplant well
- Susceptible to foliar fungal spots, blights & cankers
- Dead leaves do not decompose well
- Only fit for well-drained soils

WINTER SAFETY INSPECTION

We recommend an annual winter safety inspection on all your trees. Having your trees inspected in advance of wet winter weather gives you the opportunity to identify potential problems and hazards and address these issues before they cause significant problems. Preventative care protects the health of your trees and often saves money in the long run.

Things we look for during an inspection include:

- Dead, broken and hanging branches
- Cracks
- Co-dominant stems
- Excessive lean
- Hollows and cavities

An arborist will check the trees and provide a written estimate for any work that they recommend.
